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Theology of Select Christmas Carols

We sing Christmas carols every year around that cold time of the year. When the wind picks up, and the days are shorter, sometimes, if you just listen carefully enough, you can hear the hummings of songs that are hundreds of years old.

But what do these songs mean? Where did they come from? Are they realistic to the Bible, the reason why we even celebrate Christmas in the first place? Read on to learn more about your favorite carols.

Angels from the Realms of Glory

About the Carol

The English poet James Montgomery composed the lyrics to "Angels from the Realms of Glory." This hymn was originally published on Christmas Eve, 1816, in the Sheffield Register, a newspaper that James Montgomery was the editor of.

Montgomery based this hymnal off of these verses from Luke: And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men.

The last stanza is usually omitted in hymnals (and even this book), but reads as followed:

> Sinners, wrung with true repentance, Doomed for guilt to endless pains, Justice now revokes your sentence, Mercy calls you; break your chains.

This final stanza completes the progression throughout the hymn. The first stanza is about the angels, the second the shepherds, the third the sages, the fourth the saints, and so this last stanza is about the fifth, the sinners.

Lyrics

Angels from the realms of glory, Wing your flight o'er all the earth; Ye who sang creation's story, Now proclaim Messiah's birth: Come and worship, Come and worship, Worship Christ, the newborn King! Shepherds, in the fields abiding, Watching o'er your flocks by night, God with man is now residing, Yonder shines the infant Light; Come and worship, Come and worship, Worship Christ, the newborn King! Sages, leave your contemplations, Brighter visions beam afar; Seek the great desire of nations, Ye have seen his natal star; Come and worship, Come and worship, Worship Christ, the newborn King! Saints before the altar bending, Watching long in hope and fear,

Suddenly the Lord, descending, In his temple shall appear: Come and worship, Come and worship, Worship Christ, the newborn King!

Analysis of Carol

Angels from the realms of glory, God created angels. They are immortal and not earthly beings, like the humans and animals on Earth. Hence, Angels are from the realms of glory. Throughout the whole hymnal, Montgomery expands his hymn to more groups of people. First it is to the angels. *Wing your flight o'er all the earth;*

"Wing" here is used as a verb, but it is a common misconception that all angels have wings. We know for certain that some angels have wings: Above it stood the seraphims: each one had six wings; with twain he covered his face, and with twain he covered his feet, and with twain he did fly. ^{Isaiah 6:2} And we know that angels do fly: And he rode upon a cherub, and did fly.

However, the angels that commonly visited Earth did not have wings. If they did, they would never be mistaken for men: And the angel of the LORD appeared unto the woman, and said unto her, Behold now, thou art barren, and bearest not: but thou shalt conceive, and bear a son... And Manoah arose, and went after his wife, and came to the man, and said unto him, Art thou the man that spakest unto the woman? And he said, I am. ^{Judges 13:3, 11} And there came two angels to Sodom at even... And they [Sodomites] called unto Lot, and said unto him, Where are the men which came in to thee this night? bring them out unto us, that we may know them. Genesis 19:1, 5

Ye who sang creation's story,

This is a reference to the Lord's answer to Job's questions, where he tells us that the morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy: Where wast thou when I laid the foundations of the earth? declare, if thou hast understanding... When the morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy?

Now proclaim Messiah's birth:

A reference not only to Gabriel, who was sent by God to Mary, ^(Luke 1:26, 27.) but also to the shepherds in the field. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people... And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude Luke 2:10, 13

of the heavenly host praising God.

Come and worship, Come and worship, Worship Christ, the newborn King!

It is important to note that it is okay to worship Jesus. The Bible makes it clear that we are not to keep idols: Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image, or any likeness of any thing that is in heaven above... Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them. ^{Exodus 20:4, 5} Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve. ^{Matthew 4:10,} Luke 4:8

But Jesus is eligible for worship. The wise men knew this when they said to King Herod: Where is he that is born King of the Jews? for we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship him.

Shepherds, in the fields abiding, Watching o'er your flocks by night, Now Montgomery has expanded his hymn to include shepherds. These lines are again a reference to the shepherds who were in the field when the choir of Angels praised God: And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward Luke 2:8, 9, 13, 14 men.

God with man is now residing,

This is an accurate statement, Jesus had been born on Earth. *Yonder shines the infant Light;*

The light referenced is what we now call the Star of Bethlehem, which is what the wise men were following to find Jesus. Saying, Where is he that is born King of the Jews? for we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship him.

And they followed the star to where Jesus was laid: When they had heard the king, they departed; and, lo, the star, which they saw in the east, went before them, till it came and stood over where the young child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced with exceeding great joy. Matthew 2:9, 10

> Come and worship, Come and worship, Worship Christ, the newborn King!

Sages, leave your contemplations,

Now Montgomery has expanded his hymnal to the sages, who are the wise men. Suddenly, these men were no longer in thought about when the savior would come. He was here now.

Brighter visions beam afar;

Because of the birth of Jesus, the future would look better. Hence, *bright visions beam afar* signals that people can receive hope of a brighter future.

Seek the great desire of nations,

A reference to Haggai, who wrote: And I will shake all nations, and the desire of all nations shall come: and I will fill this house with glory, saith the LORD of hosts. ^{Haggai 2:7} Here Here Haggai is looking to Jesus's prophetic future when Jesus will rule on Earth. Jesus will fulfill that during his second coming.

Ye have seen his natal star;

Again a reference to the Star of Bethlehem. Perhaps also a warning. The Star has come, people should know that Jesus is born and come to him and seek the great desire of nations.

> Come and worship, Come and worship, Worship Christ, the newborn King!

Saints before the altar bending,

Last, Montgomery is expanding his hymnal to include saints, or believers in Jesus Christ.

Watching long in hope and fear,

Today the intense watching and waiting for Jesus to come back is still occurring. We have been doing as Jesus instructed for nearly two thousand years: Watch therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come. ^{Matthew 24:42} It is hope for the Saints, who long for Jesus's return, and it is fear for the unbelievers, when they realize the coming judgment.

Suddenly the Lord, descending,

And when Jesus returns, it will be a sudden event that all will know about: For as the lightning cometh out of the east, and shineth even unto the west; so shall also the coming of the Son of man be. ^{Matthew 24:27} That is why Jesus tells us not to believe people who claim to have seen

him: Wherefore if they shall say unto you, Behold, he is in the desert; go not forth: behold, he is in the secret chambers; believe it not. Matthew 24:26

In his temple shall appear:

Unfortunately, there is no biblical support that Jesus will appear in a temple on his return. In fact, we are told that after all is done and Jesus has given all the judgments and rewards, that there will be no temple. And I saw no temple therein: for the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb are the temple of it. ^{Revelation 21:22} The subject of the temple is an engaging thought, as the Jewish people in Israel today are desperate to build the third temple. However, this political thought would not have been common when Montgomery wrote this hymn in 1816. Israel was not yet again a country at that time. We can only ponder what thoughts Montgomery had for this line. Come and worship, Come and worship, Worship Christ, the newborn King!

Angels We Have Heard on High

About the Carol

While we do not know the author of "Angels We Have Heard on High," we know that it was translated from the French "*Anges Dans Nos Campagnes*" by Bishop James Chadwick in 1860. The hymn, in the Frech version, was first published by the Diocese of Quebec in 1819, in the *Nouveau recueil de cantiques*, or 'New Hymnal.' The original hymn in French was eight stanzas, with communication between the shepherds, the angels, and the women in all eight stanzas, but James Chadwick shortened this down to four stanzas in English.

Lyrics

Angels we have heard on high Sweetly singing o'er the plains And the mountains in reply Echoing their joyous strains Gloria, in excelsis Deo! Gloria, in excelsis Deo! Shepherds, why this jubilee? Why your joyous strains prolong? What the gladsome tidings be Which inspire your heavenly song? Gloria, in excelsis Deo! Gloria, in excelsis Deo! *Come to Bethlehem and see* Him Whose birth the angels sing; Come, adore on bended knee, Christ the Lord, the newborn King. Gloria, in excelsis Deo! Gloria, in excelsis Deo! See him in a manger laid Jesus Lord of heaven and earth; Mary, Joseph, lend your aid, With us sing our Savior's birth.

Analysis of Carol

This song is a simple retelling of the shepherds' tale as found in Luke 2:8-20. The angels came and proclaimed to the shepherds that the Messiah had come! It is possible that the hymn is the shepherds recounting their tale, as recorded in Luke: And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child... And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the Luke 2:17, 20 things that they had heard and seen, as it was told unto them.

Angels we have heard on high Sweetly singing o'er the plains

For these two lines, the shepherds are recounting how they heard of the birth of the Messiah: And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men.

And the mountains in reply Echoing their joyous strains

And here, the hymnist is claiming the song was so loud, it echoed off the nearby mountains. This is unfounded in the New Testament, however it is not meant to be taken literally. Rather, this line shows that the earth was symbolically taking part of the celebration.

Gloria, in excelsis Deo! Gloria, in excelsis Deo!

Translated from Latin, these lines mean "Glory to God in the highest." This is what the choir of angels sang to praise God. And

suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will Luke 2:13, 14 toward men.

Shepherds: why this jubilee?

Here, the Shepherds are speaking. "Why this jubilee?" This simple question could have a couple different meanings: First, a Jubilee was the fiftieth year, and was a time when slaves were freed, and land was returned to their former owners. Thus, this was a time of celebration and rejoicing. Some believe that Jesus was born on a Jubilee year. Second, and the intended meaning by the author, a "jubilee" is a great public joy. The angels absolutely showed this by praising God in a choir to the shepherds.

Why your joyous strains prolong? What the gladsome tidings be Which inspire your heavenly song?

The shepherds are still questioning the angels, "Why are you singing a wholesome, heavenly song?" And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people.

Gloria, in excelsis Deo! Gloria, in excelsis Deo!

Come to Bethlehem and see Him Whose birth the angels sing; And the angels respond: "Come and see:" Indeed, the angel said to the shepherds: For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in Luke 2:11, 12 a manger.

Come, adore on bended knee, Christ the Lord, the newborn King.

This is not recorded, but we know that the shepherds went to see Jesus: And it came to pass, as the angels were gone away from them into heaven, the shepherds said one to another, Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us. And they came with haste, and found Mary, and Luke 2:15, 16 Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger.

> Gloria, in excelsis Deo! Gloria, in excelsis Deo!

See him in a manger laid Jesus Lord of heaven and earth;

And the shepherds did: And they came with haste, and found Mary, and Luke 2:16 Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger.

Mary, Joseph, lend your aid, With us sing our Savior's birth.

The shepherds are not recorded as ever saying this to Mary and Joseph, and it is doubtful that Mary would have, for Luke recorded: But Mary kept all these things, and pondered them in her heart.

> Gloria, in excelsis Deo! Gloria, in excelsis Deo!

Away in A Manger

About the Carol

"Away in A Manger" was traditionally thought to have been written by Martin Luther, however this claim has come into doubt. The German version of the song seems to be translated from the English, because the meter of the song is not natural to German. The author of the first two verses is not known, but the third verse, a prayer, was added later to the song in *Gabriel's Vineyard Songs*, published 1892.

Fred Gaely (1894-1976) believed that "Away in a Manger" was a completely American hymn, originating from German Lutherans in Pennsylvania around 1885. Around that time the hymn appeared in *Little Children's Book for Schools and Families*, published by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in North America for Sunday School.

Lyrics

Away in a manger no crib for a bed The little lord jesus laid down his sweet head The stars in the bright sky looked down where he lay The little lord Jesus asleep on the hay. The cattle are lowing the baby awakes But little lord Jesus no crying he makes. I love you lord Jesus; look down from the sky And stay by my side until morning is nigh. Be near me lord Jesus I ask you to stay Close by me for ever, and love me, I pray. Bless all the dear children in your tender care, And fit us for heaven, to live with you there.

Analysis of Carol

Away in a manger no crib for a bed

Just as Luke records, And she [Mary] brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn.

However, many people do not know the reason Jesus was born in a manger. The answer is simple: the Romans were conducting a census and demanded them to be in Bethlehem. And it came to pass in those days, that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that all the world should be taxed. (And this taxing was first made when Cyrenius was governor of Syria.) And all went to be taxed, every one into his own city. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, out of the city of Nazareth, into Judaea, unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem; (because he was of the house and lineage of David:) To be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being great with child.

As it so happens, baby Jesus was ready to be born. Every mother knows that you cannot delay giving birth. It happens when it happens: And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered. ^{Luke 2:6} Since there was a census, Bethlehem was filled up. The inn did not have room for Joseph and Mary, so they laid Jesus in the manger.

> The little lord Jesus laid down his sweet head The stars in the bright sky looked down where he lay The little lord Jesus asleep on the hay.

We do not know for certain if Jesus lay in hay or straw, but that is not the point of these lines. Here, the author is showing how humble Jesus's birth was. This is the King of Kings, Lord of Lords, laying in the hay. This shows that Jesus is always approachable, he is not guarded by gates, doors, walls, or guards. He understands the plight of the poor, as even his earthly family could not provide a bed for him. It is as Jesus said, The foxes have holes, and the birds of the air have nests; but the Son of man hath not where to lay his head 8:20 cf. Luke 9:58

The cattle are lowing the baby awakes

It logically follows that if Jesus and his family are in a manger, then barn animals are nearby.

But little lord Jesus no crying he makes. his is an interesting line, however there is nothing recorded in the Bible about this. But it makes sense that as perfect human being, even as a babe, Jesus would show peace and bring about peace to his surroundings. That is the point that the author is trying to get across. However, if Jesus could cry as an adult, ^{John 11:35} then he could probably cry as a little babe.

More interesting is the fact that the gospels do not record Jesus as ever doing the opposite of crying. That is to say, Jesus never laughed.

I love you lord Jesus; look down from the sky And stay by my side until morning is nigh.

A wonderful request asking for our Lord to give us attention.

Be near me lord Jesus I ask you to stay Close by me for ever, and love me, I pray.

Another wonderful request, the author truly believes that Jesus answers prayers. Of course, this may not be the most biblical thing. Jesus never once said to prayer to him, only to ask in his name, and even when that happens, Jesus will not pray on our behalf. In that day you will ask in my name, and I do not say to you that I will ask the Father on your behalf. ^{John 16:26} He explains that it is not necessary,

because God loves us.

Bless all the dear children in your tender care, Jesus cared deeply about children. Suffer little children, and forbid them not, to come unto me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven. ^{19:14} And whosoever shall offend one of these little ones that believe in me, it is better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and he were Mark 9:42 cast into the sea. And of course, child have their angels which look after them specifically. Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones; for I say unto you, That in heaven their angels do always behold the face of my Matthew 18:10 Father which is in heaven. *And fit us for heaven, to live with you there.*

And to make us fit for Heaven, Jesus tells us, Verily I say unto you,

Except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into Matthew 18:3

This process is not likely nice, as Jesus purges the branches that

bear fruit so they may bear more. Every branch in me that beareth not

fruit he taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit. ^{John 15:2} Purging, or in more modern English, pruning branches, it not a nice process for the branch. It is literally the cutting off of pieces of the plant! It is fallacious to believe that Jesus would want us to have an easy life on Earth (especially when we consider will we have an eternity in heaven) when he directly says otherwise.

We should not forget that he is the good shepherd. ^{John 10:1-21} However, even the shepherd leaves the ninety-nine sheep in the field to find one lost sheep. ^{Luke 15:4-7} What happens to the ninetynine in the field? They are left to tend for themselves, but at least they know what their master wants. For them to stay put. Likewise, even if Jesus is not pruning us, we can still know what he wants. He wants us to do the will of God. ^{Matthew 7:21} Jesus even gets frustrated when people say they do, but in actuality do not.

Christians Awake Salute the Happy Morn

About the Carol

John Byrom wrote "Christians Awake Salute the Happy Morn" (1692-1763). During his life, Byrom did not seek much respect as a writer. It was only after his death that his writings were published, once in 1773, and a more complete edition in 1814.

Lyrics

Christians, awake, salute the happy morn Whereon the Savior of the world was born *Rise to adore the mystery of love* Which hosts of angels chanted from above With them the joyful tidings first begun Of God incarnate and the virgin's Son. Then to the watchful shepherds it was told Who heard th'angelic herald's voice: "Behold I bring good tidings of a Savior's birth To you and all the nations of the earth This day hath God fulfilled his promised Word; This day is born a Saviour, Christ the Lord." He spake, and straightaway the celestial choir In hymns of joy, unknown before, conspire The praises of redeeming love they sang And Heaven's whole orb with alleluias rang God's highest glory was their anthem still. Peace on the earth and unto men good will. To Bethlehem straight the enlightened shepherds ran To see the wonder God had wrought for man And found, with Joseph and the blessed maid Her Son, the Saviour, in a manger laid

Then to their flocks, still praising God, return And their glad hearts with holy rapture burn. Like Mary let us ponder in our mind God's wondrous love in saving lost mankind! Trace we the Babe, who hath retrieved our loss, From his poor manger to his bitter cross, Tread in his steps, assisted by his grace, Till man's first heav'nly state again takes place. Then may we hope, the angelic hosts among, To sing, redeemed, a glad triumphal song. He that was born upon this joyful day Around us all his glory shall display. Saved by his love, incessantly we sing Eternal praise to Heaven's almighty King.

Analysis of Carol

Christians, awake, salute the happy morn Whereon the Savior of the world was born

December 25th is as good a day as any to praise the birth of Jesus, especially since we do not know the exact day of his birth.

Rise to adore the mystery of love

The Bible speaks a lot about love, but it never says that love is a mystery. This line is completely made up by the author.

Which hosts of angels chanted from above With them the joyful tidings first begun

A reference to the choir of angels who praised God before the shepherds. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men.

Of God incarnate and the virgin's Son We know that Jesus is Lord for plenty of reasons, but the best is that Jesus did not correct Thomas' assertion: And Thomas answered and said unto him, My Lord and my God. Jesus saith unto him, Thomas, because thou hast seen me, thou hast believed.

Isaiah might also have recorded that Jesus was to be born of a virgin. Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel. Isaiah 7:14

However, there is some discussion that the Hebrew word for

"virgin" in Isaiah's verse was supposed to mean "maiden" instead.

Then to the watchful shepherds it was told Who heard th'angelic herald's voice: "Behold I bring good tidings of a Savior's birth To you and all the nations of the earth This day hath God fulfilled his promised Word; This day is born a Saviour, Christ the Lord."

While not quite what the angel said, this is really close. The exact record is, And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, glory to God in the Luke 2:10-14 highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men.

He spake, and straightaway the celestial choir In hymns of joy, unknown before, conspire The praises of redeeming love they sang And Heaven's whole orb with alleluias rang

Unfortunately, it is not recorded whether all of heaven was filled with hallelujahs.

God's highest glory was their anthem still. Peace on the earth and unto men good will

These lines are pretty close to what is recorded in Luke. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will Luke 2:13, 14 toward men.

> To Bethlehem straight the enlightened shepherds ran To see the wonder God had wrought for man

And found, with Joseph and the blessed maid Her Son, the Saviour, in a manger laid

And it came to pass, as the angels were gone away from them into heaven, the shepherds said one to another, Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us. And they came with haste, and found Mary, and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger.

Then to their flocks, still praising God, return And their glad hearts with holy rapture burn.

The author has taken some artistic liberties with this Christmas passage, but once again, these lines match up close enough. And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen, as it was told unto them.

Like Mary let us ponder in our mind God's wondrous love in saving lost mankind!

It is not known if "God's love" was what Mary was pondering, the Bible only records, But Mary kept all these things, and pondered them in her heart.

Luke uses this terminology one more time, when Mary and Joseph lost track of Jesus, and find him in the Temple. And [Jesus] said unto them, How is it that ye sought me? wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business? And they understood not the saying which he spake unto them. And he went down with them, and came to Nazareth, and was subject unto them: but his mother kept all these sayings in her heart. It is just as likely that Mary was pondering how difficult it would be to raisea king as a child, rather than pondering about God's love for humanity.

> Trace we the Babe, who hath retrieved our loss, From his poor manger to his bitter cross, Tread in his steps, assisted by his grace, Till man's first heav'nly state again takes place.

This last line references the resurrection. Jesus speaks about it quite a bit, but two verses record him saying, But they which shall be accounted worthy to obtain that world, and the resurrection from the dead, neither marry, nor are given in marriage: Neither can they die any more: for they are equal unto the angels; and are the children of God, being the Luke 20:35, 36 children of the resurrection.

> Then may we hope, the angelic hosts among, To sing, redeemed, a glad triumphal song. He that was born upon this joyful day Around us all his glory shall display. Saved by his love, incessantly we sing Eternal praise to Heaven's almighty King.

Coventry Carol

About the Carol

This hymn originates from the 1500s and was part of a play performed in Coventry, England. Hence its name, "Coventry Carol."

Since before the 1200s plays called "Mystery Plays" became popular in England. Despite the name, "mystery" is not a reference to an actual "mystery," but to the "mysterious" nature of miracles. In many towns, there would be plays of various Biblical stories throughout the year, from the creation of the world to the coming judgment. Coventry was one of the bigger towns having these plays, however many of the plays were lost because of the nature of history and persecutions in later centuries, particularly when England changed from Catholic to Protestant.

"Coventry Carol" was one play that survived, due to a manuscript dating back to 1591. Originally, this was part of a play called *The Pageant of the Shearmen and Taylors*, which speaks about the nativity, the announcement of Christ, and finally to the massacre of the innocents, the subject of this carol.

Lyrics

Lully, lullay, Thou little tiny child, Bye, bye, lully, lullay. Analysis of Carol

'Lully' and 'lullay' both share the same root as the word 'lull,' which means to put to sleep or rest by soothing. It's the same root as in the word 'lullaby,' which is what this song really is: a lullaby about the circumstances of Jesus's birth.

This stanza merely tells us the subject of the carol, that little tiny child. Despite this carol being in a book about Christmas Carols, this child is not Jesus.

The singer of this song is a poor mother, who has a child. She is asking her sisters how to "preserve" this day - how to keep or save from injury, this day. Then she explains why she wants to preserve the day for her poor youngling.

Now we come to the Biblical crux of the story, Herod's mad slaying of children: Then Herod, when he saw that he was mocked of the wise

The poor mother singing this song is sad that her child is destined to die. She knows nothing of Jesus, only the harsh reality that her child will die. Jesus's birth did not bring peace to Bethlehem. Wise was Jesus to say, Think not that I am come to send peace on earth: I came not to send peace, but a sword.

Analysis of Carol

There is no description given of Gabriel, however other angelic beings have been noted for having eyes as flame. However, the wings are even worse, as angelic beings in the Bible rarely have wings. It is only the seraphim that do, ^(Isaiah 6:2.) the typical angel does not. If the typical angel did, then no one would confuse them with ordinary men. ^(Such as what happened with Lot. See Genesis 19:1-11.)

"In the Bleak Midwinter" was written as a poem by Chrstina Rossetti (1830-1894) in 1872 when the magazine Scribner's Monthlys requested Christmas poems. The poem caught the attention of the public, and two musicians, Gustav Holst (1874-1934) and Harold Darke (1888-1976) both wrote a melody to sing the poem to.

We do not know when Jesus was born, whether it was during the day, or the night, during the summer, or the winter. All we can be certain of is that he was born in Bethlehem and laid in a manger.

These lines can be interpreted as saying. "Heaven cannot contain Jesus," but that is not quite correct. The author is trying to focus on what happens when Jesus comes back to reign. After his millennial reign, ^(Revelations 20:2-6.) Jesus will judge the dead and the angels ^(Revelations 20:7-15.) and there will be a new heaven and a new earth. And I saw a new heaven and a new earth: for the first heaven and the first earth were passed away; and there was no more sea.

Isaiah writes, And there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a Branch shall grow out of his roots: And the spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the LORD; and shall make him of quick understanding in the fear of the LORD: and he shall not judge after the sight of his eyes, neither reprove after the Isaiah 11:1-3

We do not know if Jesus was born during winter, however it is unlikely. The reason Mary and Joseph were even in Bethlehem was because Caesar Augustus wanted to tax them. It is unlikely that Caesar would want his subjects to travel during winter, which could expose some risk to the elderly or those with children.

The New Testament writers did not record when Mary gave birth. From tradition, believe that Jesus was born during nighttime.

"Mary's Boy Child" is a relatively recent carol written by Jester Hairston (1901-2000) in 1956. When Harry Belafonte (born 1927) heard the song, he recorded it and released it as a single. It was the first single to sell over a million copies in the United Kingdom alone.

Analysis of Carol

Long time ago in Bethlehem So the Holy Bible say Mary's Boy Child, Jesus Christ Was born on Christmas Day!

While the Bible does not say that Jesus was born on Christmas Day, it tells the tale of Jesus's birth. That tale is where the holiday of Christmas comes from. So this stanza is technically incorrect, but spiritually correct.

While shepherds watched their flocks by night An allusion to the shepherds in Luke 2:8-20.

They saw a bright new shining star The shepherds did not see the star, rather they learned about Jesus's whereabouts from the angel who said, Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger... And it came to pass, as the angels were gone away from them into heaven, the shepherds said one to another, Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us.

> And heard a choir from heaven sing The music came from afar

We do not know if there was music when the angelic choir sang, all we know is what this verse gives us: And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God.

> Hark! Now hear the angels sing: "New King's born today

And man will live for evermore Because of Christmas Day!"

This is not what the choir sang. All they said was, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men" (Luke 2:14). Now, the singular angel who spoke to the shepherds did say "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. ^{Luke 2:11} They said nothing regarding everlasting life.

Now Joseph and his wife Mary Came to Bethlehem that night.

Mary and Joseph were already in Bethlehem, they did not come to Bethlehem specifically for Mary to give birth to Jesus. Furthermore, Mary gave birth before the angels sang to the shepherds.

They found no place to bear her Child, Not a single room was in sight.

True. Luke records, And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no Luke 2:7

Hark! Now hear the angels sing: "New King's born today And man will live for evermore Because of Christmas Day!"

By and by they found a little nook In a stable all forlorn. And in a manger cold and dark Mary's little Boy Child was born Since we do not know if Jesus was born during the day or during the night, or during the warm months or during the cold months, this stanza is speculative.

"O Come, All Ye Faithful" is a carol dating from the 18th century. It existed first in the Latin as "*Adeste Fideles*." The Catholic priest Frederick Oakeley (1802-1880) translated it to English in 1841.

Analysis of Carol

This carol is excessively repetitive, so there is not much to analyze that either is not repeated, or has not been said half a dozen times already.

This carol was originally written in Latin, titled "*Veni, veni, Emmanuel*." It is unknown when exactly the Latin version originated, but it is believed to have been first documented in Germany in 1710. In 1861, John Mason Neale (1818-1866) translated the Latin into the English we know today.

"O Holy Night" originally refereed to the music composed by Adolphe Adam (1803-1856) in 1847, to the French poem "Minuit, chrétiens" (Midnight, Christians). "*Minuit, chrétiens*" was originally written by Placide Cappeau (1808-1877).

"Silent Night" is a very popular carol written by Joseph Mohr (1792-1848) in 1816, with the music composed by his friend Franz Xaver Gruber (1787-1863) two years later. The carol is such in inextricable part of Christian culture that it was declared an intangible cultural heritage by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) in 2011.

The First Noel

About the Carol

"The First Noel" is a traditional English carol, so old that it uses the word "Noel" as a synonym for "Christmas." It is believed to be of Cornish origin, and was first published in a book titled *Carols Ancient and Modern*, edited by William Sandys in 1823. The message of the song is the joyous pronouncement that the King of Israel has been born. When we sing the song or wish someone a joyous noel, we are following the example of the angels, announcing the good news that Jesus Christ was born, not just for Israel, but for all mankind, so we could receive forgiveness of sins through him.

The first Noel the angels did say Was to certain poor shepherds in fields as they lay: In fields where they lay keeping their sheep On a cold winter's night that was so deep. Good Christian, fear: for sinners here The silent Word is pleading.

Jesus came not for the righteous, such as the Pharisees, but for the sinners. This is a message he said often. But go ye and learn what that meaneth, I will have mercy, and not sacrifice: for I am not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance. ^{Matthew 9:13} And When Jesus heard it, he saith unto them, They that are whole have no need of the physician, but they that are sick: I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to ^{Mark 2:17} cf. Luke 5:32 repentance.

Nails, spear shall pierce him through,

A reference to the nailing of Jesus to the cross, which also follows a prophecy from David. For dogs have compassed me: the assembly of the wicked have inclosed me: they pierced my hands and my feet.

A reference to the opening of the fourth gospel, And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth.
